
GIBBS FARM VIRTUAL TOUR GUIDE: THE FARMHOUSE

Welcome to the historic Gibbs Farmhouse!

The family that lived in this house moved to Minnesota in 1849. Their names were Jane and Heman Gibbs. Jane had lived in Minnesota before, in the 1830s. She lived near a group of Dakota people called Cloud Man's village near Bde Maka Ska. Eventually she moved away until she met her husband Heman and they returned together. After spending five years living in a tiny log and sod dugout, they began work on a log cabin that, after two additions, became the farmhouse we have today.

The Parlor

The parlor is the nicest room in the house. It was meant for guests to see! Often times, children were only allowed in this room on Sundays and had to play or read quietly.

The Original Room

This space is called the Original Room. This started as the Gibbs family's second log cabin. The whole family lived in this space! There are places for sleeping, cooking, eating, working, and storing things.

Count the objects in this room were used for chores!


Let's turn around and head back through the parlor and up the stairs!

The second floor of the farmhouse with all of its bedrooms was built several years after the family had been living in the Original Room log cabin.


Let's look at Ida, Abbie, and Lillie's room first!

-  Find the tool that helps keep toes toasty at night


The Girls' Bedchamber Think-a-thon:

The Farm Lab

When the Gibbs family's market gardening business began to do really well, Heman needed more help with the farming. Each spring he would hire helpers called farm hands. They would get paid for their work and get a place to sleep and food each day. This is the room where they slept. It was called "the Pen."

Today, it is called the farm lab. There are a bunch of tools that Heman would have needed to work his land. Take a look around and then put the five steps of farming in order below!


What are the five steps of farming?

The Summer Kitchen


This room is called the Summer Kitchen. It was added on and used for cooking breakfast, lunch, and dinner for the family and farmhands during the spring, summer, and fall. During the winter, there was not much for the farmhands to do so they usually went back to their own homes. This room was too expensive for the Gibbs family to keep warm, so they usually closed it off until the helpers returned.

The Summer Kitchen Scavenger Hunt:




-  Find the best place to keep leftovers fresh for another day or two
